This course aims to enhance students' skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing, and to help students learn the basic grammatical patterns of the English language, as well as to improve their vocabulary through exercises such as deriving verbs, nouns and other parts of speech using synonyms and antonyms. The course also includes exercises to deal with spelling, pronunciation, and writing, and complement the skills presented in English Language Skills (1).

This course helps students to write simple sentences and introduces them to the concept of sentence, its components, and structure in English language, in addition to training them to use punctuation marks and linking words, especially the correct use of vocabulary, grammar, and grammatical and morphological structures, besides to provide them with the skills of writing sentences and paragraphs in different writing styles (descriptive, practical, narrative...) and motivate them to use independent thinking and convey ideas by writing paragraphs that clearly reflect these ideas.

This course aims to cover the theoretical and practical aspects of sounds in the English language and to teach the manner and places of articulation and their role in the production of sounds which enables students to know the different English sounds and how to write them with phonetic symbols and describe how they are pronounced. The course also introduces of symbols IPA (International Phonetic Alphabet) for consonants and vowels, presents the concepts of active and passive articulators, and enables students to distinguish between them, through giving intensive exercises and using the language laboratory.

This course aims to introduce students to a general introduction to grammar: parts of speech, sentence elements, simple tenses, continuous tenses, perfect tenses, short questions, interrogatives, and negation (negation and its tools). The main objective of this course is to provide students with grammatical subjects to prepare for the next course, which is English Grammar (2).

The course is concerned with studying sounds, their patterns, their distribution, and the way they are written. It also focuses on the study of the phoneme, minimal pairs, stressed and unstressed syllables, intonation, tone, complementary distribution, and free variation.

This course also aims to develop students' mental skills that enable them to interpret, analyze, and appreciate the texts and methods used in these literary genres, and issue judgments, comparisons, and comments on the interrelationship between what they have studied and the world in which they live.

This course aims to introduce students to American literature from its beginnings to the present era. This course also aims to highlight the development of American literature through the ages and its importance in our present time. It also aims to shed light on literary movements, literary history, main topics, and general characteristics of American culture.

Description

This course deals with Shakespeare and the Renaissance, in which Shakespeare's poetic and theatrical works are studied after 1600. The focus is on studying the critical development of Shakespeare's language, his dramatic methods, and the purposes of his plays. Examples of his plays will be studied, and topics related to theatrical characters will be discussed in this course, and discussion of various theatrical scenes will be encouraged. It also studies the works of the writer Christopher Marlowe and others of the Renaissance.

This course aims to train students to monitor selections of English poetry in the Renaissance, the Classical era, the Romantic period, and the Victorian era. It aims at training students in practical application to develop their skills in reading poetry as a hobby and absorbing all its artistic features such as simile, metaphor, etc., and poems of great poets, such as Marlowe, Sidney, Milton, Spencer, Wordsworth, Keats and Tennyson, will be analyzed and commented on, and the characteristics of poetry will be studied in all the previously mentioned periods. Description

The course presents the concept of world literature, its development, and the latest and modern concepts about world literature. Students will become acquainted with the primary texts that gained a place in "world literature", a Semester often used to describe literary works that have been successfully received outside their national borders, but that also draw attention to the "world work", its place in the world, and its relationship to literature and other works of art. Texts by well-known and lesser-known writers will be read together with unknown writers, "universal writers" and discuss why these texts deserve such a universal reception. Each core text is matched to a core theoretical critical text whose concerns are reflected in the core text. Some of the theories put forward by critics such as (Bezer, Damrosch, Said, Spivak, Dabashi, Casanova, Shi, Moretti, Siskind, Apter)

Description

This course aims to provide students with the methods and practices of teaching English as a foreign language. The course presents the basic assumptions that deal with the nature of language and the methods of learning and teaching it. The course provides practical information for teaching the linguistic elements of the language, i.e. pronunciation, vocabulary, and grammar, and it discusses the main factors affecting the methods and the importance of motivation and classroom activities in learning. The course also aims to guide students in the forms of daily and quarterly lesson planning, writing, and analyzing classroom activities for English language skills and building tests for those skills. The course presents a practical application of the interactive and communicative teaching method in teaching and learning the language.

Description



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This course deals with the study of Western thought and civilization in different historical periods: from the Roman and Greek eras, the Middle Ages, and the Renaissance to the modern era and the main achievements that occurred in these eras such as scientific and political development, the industrial revolution and the relationship between the West and the world. This course focuses on some of the works of Western writers whose works are related to non-literary philosophical works and poetry to give meaning to facts. Students explore the wealth and breadth of contemporary philosophical thought, environmental memoirs, aesthetic and ethical issues, literary journalism, and philosophical issues igniting debate in the West, particularly in relation to the East; the new Orientalism; Islamophobia, and the Apocalypse.

This course aims to study the meaning and its relationship to the linguistic structure, where the student deals with the nature of the meaning: denotation, connotation, and vocabulary meanings. It also examines the relationship between sentences and the relationship of words in the sentence in terms of grammar and semantics or meaning, and it aims to analyze the sentence from several aspects, such as the figurative or literal meaning and its applications.

This course is given to students at an advanced stage to develop their abilities in analyzing grammatical structures, and students learn about theory and applications according to what suits the grammatical structure, and the structure of English language is tested by the generative transformational framework approach, where students learn how to derive the surface structure of the sentence from the deep structure through the rules of phrase structure and transformational rules.

Among the topics that this course addresses: language change, dialectal differences, bilingualism, language communities, language preservation, language strength, policies and their impact on language, concepts of language loss, language death and language revival, slang, level of language planning
